Counselor's Notes

Here are six ways that parents can help their children with reading:

Provide many opportunities for your child to read books or other materials. Read aloud to your child. Research shows that this is the most important activity that parents can do to increase their child's chance of reading success. Keep reading aloud even when your child can read independently.

Make time for the library.

Play games like Scrabble®, Spill and SpellTM, Scattergories®, and BalderdashTM together.

Follow your child's interests, and find fiction and nonfiction books that tie into these interests. You can use a third-party site like <u>The Lexile Framework for Reading</u> to help find the right book for your reader.

Work crossword puzzles with your child. Give a magazine subscription as a gift.

Here are five ways that parents can help their children with mathematics:

Spend time with kids on simple board games, puzzles, and activities that encourage strong math skills. Even everyday activities, such as playing in a sandbox or in a bath tub can teach children math concepts such as weight, density, and volume. Check your TV listings for shows that can reinforce math skills in a practical and fun way.

Encourage children to solve problems. Provide assistance, but let them figure it out themselves. Problem solving is a lifetime skill.

The kitchen is filled with opportunities to teach fractional measurements, such as doubling and dividing cookie ingredients. Point out ways that people use math every day to pay bills, balance their checkbooks, make change, and calculate a tip at restaurants. When you're in up over your head, the first thing to do is close your mouth. Involve older children in projects that incorporate geometric and algebraic concepts, such as planting a garden, building a bookshelf, or figuring how long it will take to drive to your family vacation destination.

Children should learn to read and interpret charts and graphs, such as those found in daily newspapers. Collecting and analyzing data will help your child draw conclusions and become discriminating readers of numerical information.

While teachers play an integral role in the education of children, it goes without saying that parental involvement makes the biggest difference in a child's scholastic success.

The Basics of Being a Good Student

- Doing well in school should be your top priority.
- Study: There is no substitute.
- Always attend class.
- Do all of the homework and assigned reading.
- Develop self-discipline.
- Manage your time.

Congratulations to the following students for being selected for Honor Bands or Honor Choirs coming up in January & February. These are extremely valuable experiences for these students to have.



Girls and Boys Basketball Senior Night Will be Saturday, January 13th, 2018


We ask that all senior parents meet in the locker room hallway before the varsity girls' warm-up begins - approximately 4:45.



How Families Can Help Children Become Better Readers

Celebrate 2018 with literacy resolutions!

Ring in the New Year by helping your child make resolutions that will strengthen her reading skills. Suggest that she resolve to:

- Read more. Your child could aim to read one book each week or each month. If she is already an avid reader, suggest she try reading a new genre each month.
- **Write more.** Ask your child to set aside time each day for some writing. She could write a poem, a letter, an entry in her journal—or anything else! If she has writer's block, show her a picture and ask her to write about it.
- Learn more. Challenge your child to learn (and use) one

new word a day. She doesn't need a fancy "word of the day" calendar; a dictionary will do. By the end of the year, she'll have 365 new words under her belt.



Teach your child to attack tough words

What should your child do when he sees a challenging word? Attack it! Word-attack strategies help readers figure out the meanings of unfamiliar words.

Encourage your child to:

- Notice pictures. Photographs and illustrations can give him clues about unfamiliar words.
- Identify chunks. Have him look for familiar sounds—or "chunks"—within words, such as "call" and "ing" in calling.
- Keep reading. He should try reading the sentence again. Or read the next sentence for more information.
- Make connections. If the unfamiliar word reminds your child of another word, the two words may be related.

topics—while building her reading skills at the same time.

Reading aloud has endless benefits

There are so many reasons to read aloud to your child—even if he can already read beautifully! Reading aloud:

- Reminds your child how pleasant reading can be.
- Improves vocabulary and listening skills.
- Helps your child enjoy new literature.
- Gives you and your child chances to discuss stories and how they relate to real life.

Use DEAR to encourage reading at home



In some classrooms, saying, "Oh, dear!" doesn't mean something's broken. It means it's time to Drop Everything And Read (DEAR)! During DEAR time, everyone sits down

for some uninterrupted reading. You can try this activity at home, too. To have some DEAR time with your family:

- Get ready. Make sure everyone has something to read. You may want to plan a trip to the library ahead of time. Keep plenty of interesting magazines and books on hand.
- Let everyone know. Establish a reading time that's convenient for all family members. Write DEAR time on your family calendar. This helps your child see that reading is an important thing in your family.



- **Start small.** Start with a weekly, half-hour session. As family members get into the reading habit, DEAR time can become more frequent.
- your family participates. So grab a novel or the newspaper, and enjoy some reading yourself. When your child sees you reading, he'll be more inspired to read himself.

Share strategies to make report writing easier

Writing a report can be a daunting task.
If your child has a writing assignment coming up, help him get his thoughts down on paper. Encourage him to:

• Start early. Writing takes time. If the report is due next week, don't let your child put it off. Sit down right away and help him think through what he might write.

- Jot down ideas. Ask your child to make a list of everything he knows about the subject of his report He doesn't need to use complete sentences—a word or two will do. When he's made his list, he may be surprised to see how much he already knows.
- **Discuss ideas.** Ask your child to talk about his ideas This will help him put his thoughts into words.
- Start in the middle. The first few sentences are often the hardest to write. Suggest that he get his main



points down first. He can write the introduction later.

- Put the draft aside. The next day, have your child read what he's written. Discuss the parts of his report that work. Then, have your child think about what would make the rest even better.
- **Revise and rewrite.** Your child should check to see if words are spelled correctly and that he has used capitals and punctuation in the right places.



Older students benefit from reading aloud, too



When was the last time you read to your child? Even though he can read on his own now, he can still benefit from reading aloud with you. When you read aloud to your child, he can:

- Stop and ask about a confusing concept or plot element.
- Notice unusual grammar, expressions or vocabulary.
- Listen for the meaning. Your child may be able to comprehend more if he isn't focused on decoding the words themselves.

To add some variety to your reading time:

go to the library together. Decide to read one book of your child's choice, then you can read one that you choose. After you finish each book, take time to talk about it. What would your child change if he were the author? What did he think of the ending?



- Read all kinds of books. Explore science fiction, historical fiction or a biography. You could also read several books in a series.
- article to read aloud to your child. Then, have him choose one to read to you. You can have a discussion about how current events will have an impact on your lives.
