Superintendent's News

As I review the past two years as your Superintended/principal I feel truly blessed. Blessed with a cooperative and supportive board of education, a very dedicated staff, wonderful students and supportive parents. Hay Springs community and patrons are extremely strong supporters of your educational system and have been supportive of my wife and I as we continue to strive to be valuable members of two communities. On a personal level the past year has brought some major changes with the passing on my mother at 97 years. She was very blessed to live a full and productive life. This has allowed for my wife to be able to spend much more time in Hay Springs with me which is nice. We do still continue to operate a farm and vineyard in Boyd County with the assistance of two sons and grandchildren, but at times are needed back there. Then there are the nineteen grandchildren that, not only require our attention, but grandma and grandpa need our connection to them, which requires some weekend travel time as well. We have fallen in love with the community of Hay Springs, it's people and the beauty of the area. Thank you to the board of education, staff, students and parents for your love and support over the past two years.

Professionally as I look back on the past two years, when I agreed to return for two additional years I felt like I wanted to be able to say we made progress toward educational excellence. If I was going to be in Hay Springs for three years, I wanted to make a difference in our educational system. That while I was here, by working together cooperatively, we made some positive changes, improvements and potential additions to curriculum etc. Some of the changes over the past two years have been a result of necessity, others have been a result of professional or personal decisions of staff and board members.

In the area of academic improvements during the 2017-19 school years we have completed a successful five-year school improvement review process with positive results. Our educational staff has all been trained in the Danielson



Instructional Model which is one of the two instructional models approved by the Nebraska Department of Education. This professional development was presented by Dr. Julie Downing form ESU #13. This year this training will continue with the revision of our instructional evaluation instrument that will be guided by the incorporation of the Danielson Instructional Model. We have expanded our curriculum in the area of career education with the addition of some distance learning, online and classroom courses. In 2019-20 we will be adding as computer science and two Agricultural Science classes in house. With the addition of a principal to the staff I have agreed to return to the classroom and teach two Ag Science courses, in an effort to develop interest and potentially starting an Ag Science program and FFA organization. Hay Springs School continues to rank well on the Nebraska state test (NSCAS) and our students perform well on the ACT assessments, however we do have areas of concern and need for improvement. During 2018-19 we have had staff attend the Nebraska Positive Behavior Intervention System training and we have initiated PBiS in to our school system. I would like to thank our PBiS leadership team for their dedication and efforts to make this a successful program. This has required a lot of out of school time commitment and summer trainings the past two years.

In the area of extra, and inter-curricular activities at Hay Springs we have expanded our business courses and added an FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America) organization. 2018-19 was our first year of Speech and Drama competition as an organized effort, and our students performed very well. Our band students traveled to Branson Missouri to perform with the Haygoods and experience other cultures.

In athletic competition we also experienced success with the football team being state runners-up and wrestling qualifying two individuals to compete in state and one state track competitor. We will

have several new members to the coaching staff who have been actively engaged with our student athlete's development this summer.

As we look forward to the 2019-20 school year I am very excited as we have spent the summer upgrading our building's heating, air conditioning and lighting systems though the utilization of an Energy Efficiency Service agreement with AMERESCO. The current concern is that their completion is before the first day of school. We also relocated some of our current classroom to facilitate having all the elementary students on one level and accommodating class number to room class size at the middle and high school level. The custodial staff has been extremely busy patching and painting class room walls where the old heating units have been removed. The technology department has also been extremely busy with upgrading software and some hardware upgrades and relocation.

The first day of school for PreK-12th grade students will be August 12th, and be a full day for all students. Kindergarten through 5th grade school hours for the year will be 8:00-4:00. Middle School and High School Students will be 8:00-4:15.

Learning:

Hay Springs Public Schools has established a tradition of focusing on student learning. With the help of the parents, community members, teachers, students and staff this amazing tradition will continue and Hay Springs will reach new heights. Our students will continue to work hard, to achieve a high level of academic success. We will provide students assistance and remediation when needed, through the efforts of an outstanding teaching and support staff. Hay Springs Public Schools is fortunate to be able to operate on a four-day school week, therefore; we ask parents to schedule doctor appointments, trips, and other activities on Friday when there is no school. Beef to School Finishes First Year

I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to everyone who had played a role in the success of the Hay Springs Beef to Hot Lunch program during the 2018-19 school year. The program began by meeting with the western region of the Nebraska



Cattlemen in the fall of 2017 in which Ms. Shavona Henry, member of the Hay Springs Board of Education, and Mr. Lechtenberg the Superintendent attended. Following that meeting, the possibility of establishing this program to support our School Lunch Program was discussed at the Board of Education meeting. With the approval of the board the process began to move forward. Ms. Henry contacted several area beef producers and we held our first meeting in the school cafeteria. Area beef producers who attended planning meetings included Brian and Muffy Forney, Travis Binger, Alisha Smith, Tara Rasmussen, and Greg Heiting. It appeared, to be obvious that we would have beef producer support to provide high quality locally raised beef for our student lunches. Next we met with Mr. Lambert, the Superintendent at Bridgeport Public School, and had a discussion about the processor they use and the particulars of the program. We then invited Denny Hoagland, the owner and operator of KDK Meats at Bridgeport, to speak at our Board of Education meeting about the slaughter process, packaging and delivery from the locker to the school. All local beef donations to the school lunch program had to be processed in a Federally inspected processing plant.

As the buzz about the potential to have locally raised beef for school lunch meals spread and individuals were contacted about support for the program, we received donations in-kind for freezers from BNSF Railroad and Russ and Sue Lechtenberg, delivery from the ranch to the locker from Greg Heiting, and from the locker to the school freezer by Forney's, Jen Young, and School personnel. Security First Bank and First State Bank made donations to assist in covering the processing costs. The major donations came from the local beef producers who have donated to this program and include: Sheridan Livestock Auction Co., Judd and Brandy Hoos, Hinn Ranch XT, Marcy Cattle Company, Zach Kraenow Cattle Company, S&V Registered Angus—Don and Mary Vannetta, and Greg and Megan Heiting. We have had a total of seven beefs donated over the past year. We have improved the quality of our school lunch program.

In August and again on the last day of school in May Security 1st Bank brought their grill up and grilled burgers for our students to kick off the beef to lunch program. The school lunch program has utilized this locally grown beef in roasts, hamburgers, taco meat, and a variety of other meat menus. The cooks have developed a burger Thursday where locally grown beef is served every Thursday during the school year. Since the majority of the school lunch program utilizes ground beef in one way or another, the most acceptable quality of beef animals have been cull middle aged cows that have had 60-90 days of feed. We have had some higher quality beef animals donated and they are very much appreciated, but they will still mostly be utilized as roast or ground beef. If you are a beef producer or are involved in an agribusiness that supports our area beef producers, or are supporters of our educational system and are interested in supporting this Beef to School Lunch program please contact the school at 308-638-4434.

On behalf of the Hay Springs students, faculty, staff, kitchen personnel and the Board of Education I want to express gratitude for the tremendous generosity and support of our educational system in getting this program started. As a school district, we are so blessed to have the overwhelming community support of our patrons.



Guidelines for Administering Medication

Whenever possible your child should be provided medications by you outside of school hours. All medication (unless approved by the Administration) is to be kept in the school office and is to be administered by assigned school personnel. In order for school personnel to give medication to your child at school, the medication must be in the original labeled container, which has the student's name, licensed heath care provider's name, medication name, and instructions on it. Ask your pharmacist for a second labeled bottle if necessary. My fake plants died because I did not pretend to water them. The parent will need to fill out and sign a permission slip available at the office. This form will include the directions on dosage and time. This is important to enable the school to safely administer medication to your child. DO NOT SEND MEDICINE THAT IS NOT LABELED OR IS NOT IN THE ORIGINAL CONTAINER.

Over the counter medication such as Tylenol, cough drops, cough syrup, etc. will only be given with written permission from the parent. Medication must be provided by the parent, the school will not provide any form of medication. This permission must be renewed with each incident. If Tylenol or other over the counter medications are needed for more than two weeks, an examination by a licensed health care provider is recommended to be sure there is no serious illness present.

The Hay Springs Board of education recognizes that many students are able to attend school because of the effective use of medication for the treatment of illness and/or disabilities.

If at all possible, all prescription medications should be given at home outside of school hours. NO over the counter medicines will be given in the elementary schools; this includes acetaminophen, Tylenol, and cough medicine. Non-prescriptive medication may be used at the Middle School and High School. Medication must be provided by the parent.

Attendance

The responsibility for the attendance of the child in school is fixed, by law, upon parents. A student missing more than 10 days per semester or 20 days per year will not receive credits for that semester/year. Parents, when reporting their child absent, must give the reasons for the absence, however, only authorized school authorities can excuse students from school.

A parent of each student is required to notify the school each day that a student is to be absent. Parents are required to notify the school before 8:30 am on the day their child is absent or the school will attempt to contact the parent. If the parent knows of an upcoming absence, please notify the school (308) 638-4434 as soon as possible. If no phone call or note is received by the office prior to the absence, the absence may be considered truancy and could be considered unexcused.

Students participating in school sponsored activities under the direction of a school approved sponsor and representing the school will not be counted as absent.

Upon reaching the following limits during a semester, the parent will be notified as follows: After the 5th day of absence, an advisory letter will be sent to the parent. After the 8th day of absence, the administration may meet with parents and student to discuss an attendance plan. After the 10th day of absence, a letter reporting the absences will be mailed to the parent and the County Attorney. After the 11th day of absence, the student will lose credit for the semester. Parents may appeal the loss of credit to the Superintendent.

Ineligibility

The ineligible list will be run weekly (generally Monday morning). Students will remain on the list until the next list is run. Grades need to be posted by 12:00 a.m. (midnight) or they may not be included when the list is run. Ineligibility list will be run between midnight and 9:00 a.m. No student will be removed from the list without the administrator approval.

To be ineligible students may have any of the following or a combination thereof:: 2 D's or 1 F

If you are on the ineligible list, you will not be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities/events for the week and will not be allowed hall pass privileges. Students will also be required to attend Friday School.

Students who end the quarter or semester with an F will automatically be in Friday school until the next list is run.

Friday School

Most school districts operate on a 5-day school week, with classes running from Monday through Friday. Our district currently operates on a 4-day school week, with classes typically running from Monday through Thursday. Some students are in need of additional assistance, so Hay Springs Public Schools has decided to staff and host school on Fridays in an effort to assist students who need additional help, instruction, or support.

Any student's building administrator may require the student to attend school on Friday morning from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM in a classroom staffed by employees of the district. Students directed to attend school on Friday will be students who, in the opinion of the administrators and teachers, (1) need additional assistance of any kind, (2) have failing grades, and/or (3) have missing assignments.

Friday school days are intended to be a learning and study time for students just like any other school day. Friday school is not a disciplinary consequence. Rather it is intended to help students who are in need of assistance. Students asked to attend Friday school as a result of or in conjunction with disciplinary action are asked to do so because they meet one of the criteria listed above and not as a part of the disciplinary consequence.

During Friday school, all of the regular policies, rules, handbooks, and codes of conduct apply, including the district's mandatory attendance policies. Failure to attend school on Friday when directed to do so by the building administrator will be counted as an absence pursuant to the district policy. Absences from Friday school must be approved in the same manner as absences from any other school day, and the district's policy governing "excused" and "unexcused" absences will apply.

Consequences for students not coming to Friday School:

• NO use of personal technology the following week. Phones will be left home or checked in at the office when they arrive at school.

- Will make up their 6 hours during the week before or after school Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday; or before school Thursday.
- Will not be offered the opportunity for credit recovery in the summer.

Hay Springs Public Schools will not provide transportation to and from Friday school. In the event any student is entitled to transportation services by the state or federal law, transportation services will be provided as required by law.

The following rules apply:

- 1. No food (except snack provided) or drink (other than water) is allowed.
- 2. No cell phones or other personal electronic devices, including head phones.
- 3. No talking or disrupting others.
- 4. If kicked out of Friday School, the student is required to bring a parent to meet with Administration prior to reentering school.
- 5. Not attending Friday School will result in a parental meeting. Students will not be allowed back to school until a parent can meet with administration.
- 6. All teachers who have students that attend mandatory Friday School will provide the student with make-up and homework assignments.
- 7. Attendance will be sent to the Friday School coordinator.

CODE OF CONDUCT -

HAY SPRINGS JR/SR HIGH SCHOOL

PROCEDURE ON VIOLATION: In the event the student is to be suspended from activities pursuant to the established rule, the following action shall be taken:

The student shall be notified immediately of the action taken.

The student shall meet with the school Activities Director and Principal. The parent/guardian should be notified and invited to attend the meeting. If sponsors, teachers, and coaches are involved they should also be invited to attend.

At this meeting, full explanation of the action taken shall be given and the student and his/her parent/guardian shall be afforded full opportunity to make any statements or explanation desired.

CRITERIA FOR SANCTIONS:

- 1. Refusal to abide by the school's requests concerning actions, appearance and general conduct as representative of Hay Springs Jr.- Sr. High School.
- 2. Violations of any rules listed below reported by school personnel and/or law, or personal admission irrespective of whether conviction occurs:
 - A. Illegal use of alcohol
 - B. Illegal possession of alcohol
 - C. Illegal use of a controlled substance
 - D. Illegal possession of a controlled substance
 - E. Possession or use of Tobacco (smoking or chewing)
 - F. Possession or use of electronic nicotine devices, Vaping, JUULing
 - G. Any crime involving violence, willful destruction of property or any actions involving moral turpitude

If Criteria for Sanction fall under A-F then the following disciplinary actions will be applied. If Criteria for Sanction Falls under G the educational component is not applicable.

First Offense: Meeting with Principal, Athletic Director, parent(s), and student:

- The Student is notified of suspension from competitions in all extracurricular/co-curricular activities for 20 calendar days during the school year and a minimum of one (1) contest/performance/activity. If all activities in which the student participates cease before the end of the suspension, the remainder of the suspension will carry over to the following year's activities so the student completes the required number of days; and
- Student must complete an approved drug and alcohol education class at the student's expense during the next available session. **(Sundays excluded and the student will be expected to attend and participate in all scheduled practices during the suspension) **

Second Offense: Meeting with Principal, Athletic Director, parent(s), and student;

- The Student is notified of suspension from competitions in all extracurricular/co-curricular activities for 40 calendar days during the school year and a minimum of one (1) contest/performance/activity. If all activities in which the student participates cease before the end of the suspension, the remainder of the suspension will carry over to the following year's activities so the student completes the required number of days; and
- Student must complete an approved drug and alcohol education class at the student's expense during the next available session. **(Sundays excluded and the student will be expected to attend and participate in all scheduled

practices during the suspension) **

<u>Third Offense:</u> Meeting with Principal, Athletic Director, parent(s), and student;

• The Student is notified of suspension from competitions in all extracurricular/co-curricular activities for 60 calendar days during the school year and a minimum of one (1) contest/performance/activity. If all activities in which the student participates cease before the end of the suspension, the remainder of the suspension will carry over to the following year's activities so the student completes the required number of days; and

Student must complete an approved drug and alcohol education class at the student's expense during the next available session. **(Sundays excluded and the student will be expected to attend and participate in all scheduled practices during the suspension) **

<u>Fourth Offense:</u> Meeting with Principal, Athletic Director, parent(s), and student;

- Suspension of eligibility to participate in activities for the remainder of the student's time as a student at Hay Springs Public Schools.
 - A. Controlled Substance or Alcohol: The student will be suspended from all activities until he/she participates in a professional evaluation for chemical dependency. After the student becomes a participant in a chemical dependency program, the student may be reinstated in school activities upon successful completion of the program. Verification of completion of the chemical dependency treatment program must be provided in writing by the director or counselor of the center prior to reinstatement of the student. The student will be suspended from participation in all school sponsored and/or sanctioned activities the next 60 calendar days. ** (Sundays excluded and the student will not be allowed to practice) **
- B. Tobacco Product or any Crime Involving Violence, Willful Destruction of Property or Moral Turpitude: The student will be suspended from participation in all school sponsored and/or sanctioned activities the next 60 calendar days.
- **(Sundays excluded and the student will not be allowed to practice)
- ***Vacation days will be EXCLUDED, except for those on which scheduled school activi-

ties are held***

When the penalty for violation cannot be completed in the confines of one (1) school year, it shall carry over into the next school year in which the student will be participating in such activities.

- School sponsored activities shall include, but not be limited to, Homecoming Dance and Prom.
- Suspension from participation shall include attendance at dances and contributing in any way to the contest/ performance.
- Participation in Graduation and Honors Night may be denied at the discretion of the administration, if it has reasonable cause to believe a student's conduct merits such suspension, for reasons to include, but not limited to, those set forth in the student Code of Conduct.

<u>SELF-REPORT OPTION</u>: If a student voluntarily reports, prior to being addressed by the administration, to the coach, sponsor, activities director, or principal within three (3) school days of the rule violation, the consequences for first and second violations will be reduced. In the case of a first violation, the suspension would be reduced to 10 days and one (1) activity. A second violation would be reduced to 20 days. This applies to first and second offenses only. Student must complete an approved drug and alcohol education class at the student's expense during the next available session.

STUDENT ABSENCE ON THE DAY OF AN ACTIVITY: A student may not participate in any extra-curricular activity on a day he/she is absent from classes due to an illness or an unexcused absence, with the exception of tardiness. The student must be in school, attending classes for the scheduled school day to be eligible to practice or participate, unless he/she is specifically excused by the administration's office.

.....SUMMER ACTIVITIES.....

Student groups holding student activities during the summer months are applicable. Such groups have students representing their school and community in school-sponsored activities all during the summer. The students who are members of these groups are not viewed as only members for a season, but rather are viewed by fellow students and community members are representing their groups on a year-round basis. In these situations, such groups must require that their members are subject to the provisions of the Hay Springs High School Code of Conduct on a year-round basis, and are therefore subject to disciplinary measures for breaches of the "Code", regardless of the season or time of the year.

<u>SUMMER PENALTIES:</u> Penalties assessed during the summer will apply at the start of school activities in the next year.


